### Dr. Rose Angelocci

Rose Angelocci, Ph.D. is a Community Work Incentives Coordinator (CWIC) with the Louisiana Benefits Planning Services and serves as one of the coordinators for the Louisiana Deafblind Project for Children and Youth. She holds a doctorate in counselor education with a minor in qualitative research methods and a Masters in Health Sciences in Rehabilitation Counseling. Dr. Angelocci is a Certified Rehabilitation Counselor, a Licensed Rehabilitation Counselor/Supervisor, a Licensed Marriage and Family Therapist, a Licensed Professional Counselor/Supervisor, a National Certified Counselor, a Board Certified Tele Mental Health provider, a Certified Vision Rehabilitation Therapist, a Certified Deafblind Intervener, and a certified Community Work Incentives Coordinator. She holds over 30 years of experience in working with individuals with disabilities.

#### **Dr. Adrianne Frischhertz**

Adrianne Frischhertz, Ph.D. is a Licensed Professional Counselor-Supervisor and Registered Play Therapist-Supervisor. Dr. Frischhertz is Assistant Professor in the Department of Counseling in the School of Allied Health Professions at LSU Health New Orleans. She has published and presented about counseling and play therapy and appears regularly on WWL's Great Day Louisiana to discuss parenting strategies. She is a graduate of both the Louisiana Counseling Association and Association for Play Therapy Leadership Academies. Previously, she served as president for both the Louisiana Association for Play Therapy and Louisiana Association for Counselor Education and Supervision boards, as well as board member of the Association for Child and Adolescent Counseling (Louisiana chapter). She serves on the editorial board of the Louisiana Counseling Association Journal. Clinically, she focuses on providing services to children ages3-12 and their caregivers, as well as supervision to those seeking licensure as a professional counselor (LPC) and certification as aRegistered Play Therapist.

### Dr. Erin Dugan

Erin Dugan is the Dean of the LSUHSC School of Allied Health Professions, a Professor of Counseling, and the Clinical Director of the LSUHSC Child & Family Counseling Clinic. In 2006, Dr. Dugan established the LSUHSC Child and Family Counseling Clinic, where she remains its Clinical Director. The clinic provides mental health services to children and families in the greater New Orleans area and offers internships to students and graduates seeking mentorship, supervision, and training. Dr. Dugan is also a recognized leader at the national and state levels. A National Certified Counselor, Licensed Professional Counselor Supervisor, and Registered Play Therapist Supervisor, she was named Chair of Board of Directors for the national Association for Play Therapy in 2020. Dr. Dugan was elected President of the Louisiana Association for Play Therapy in 2011 as well as the Louisiana Association for Counselor Educators and Supervisors in 2010.

Diagnosing Mood Disorders: Clarity, Competence, and Compassion in Clinical Practice

Accurate diagnosis of mood disorders is essential for effective treatment planning, ethical practice, and improved client outcomes—yet many clinicians report uncertainty when differentiating between depressive, bipolar, and related conditions. This engaging, clinically grounded seminar is designed for Licensed Professional Counselors seeking to

strengthen their diagnostic skills, sharpen their use of the DSM-5-TR, and increase confidence in identifying complex mood presentations.

Using real-world case examples, interactive tools, and cultural considerations, participants will explore key differences between Major Depressive Disorder, Bipolar I & II, Cyclothymia, and Persistent Depressive Disorder. The training also examines comorbid conditions, substance-induced mood changes, and ethical implications of diagnosis across diverse populations. Whether you're newly licensed or a seasoned clinician, this session will provide clarity and clinical nuance to support competent, compassionate care.

Supported Employment for Individuals with Schizophrenia

Employment can play a transformative role in the recovery journey of individuals living with schizophrenia, offering not just financial independence, but dignity, structure, and hope. This seminar explores the principles and practice of Supported Employment, with a focus on the Individual Placement and Support (IPS) model—an evidence-based approach to helping people with serious mental illness (SMI) obtain and sustain competitive employment.

Participants will examine common functional challenges related to schizophrenia—including cognitive, social, and motivational barriers—and how counselors can support clients in preparing for, entering, and maintaining meaningful work. Through real-world case examples, role plays, and discussion, attendees will learn how to collaborate with employment specialists, support workplace accommodations, and foster empowerment in the vocational rehabilitation process.

Increasing the Professional Counselor's Confidence and Comfort When Serving
Clients with Disabilities

Ever felt apprehensive or uncomfortable serving a client with a disability? This seminar will discuss myths, attitudes, and beliefs about disability and the impact on the counseling relationship and in client's themselves. Attendees will learn practical strategies and effective communication tips for the professional counselor's increased comfort in serving a variety of people with disabilities. Ways to accommodate individuals within the counseling process and beyond will be explored.

By the end of this seminar, participants will be able to:

- 1. Describe the core principles of Supported Employment and the IPS model for individuals with schizophrenia.
- 2. Identify how positive, negative, and cognitive symptoms of schizophrenia impact employment functioning.
- 3. Apply practical strategies to support motivation, skill-building, and job retention in clients with SMI.
- 4. Explore the counselor's role in interdisciplinary collaboration and advocacy for workplace accommodations.
- 5. Examine ethical considerations in client autonomy, disclosure, and employment-related decision-making.
- 6. Develop creative interventions tailored to clients' preferred media.
- 7. Address ethical and cultural considerations in using pop culture clinically.

From Lyrics to Liberation: Using Pop Culture in Counseling to Build Rapport and Foster Insight

Dr. Holly Walters

In a world where therapy competes with TikTok trends, Taylor Swift albums, and Marvel movie marathons, why not bring pop culture into the room instead of working around it? This interactive seminar explores how counselors can ethically and creatively use music, movies, and media to deepen rapport, enhance self-reflection, and foster emotional insight.

Grounded in clinical theory and packed with practical application, the course introduces strategies for incorporating client-identified cultural content—like song lyrics, character arcs, or fandom themes—into case conceptualization, narrative therapy, and CBT

interventions. Participants will examine the psychological value of media symbolism, the risks and rewards of cultural referencing in session, and how to honor client identity through shared language and themes. Special attention is given to how these tools can bridge generational, cultural, and relational gaps in both individual and group counseling.

Whether you're a Swiftie, a Jedi, or just culturally curious, this course helps clinicians turn what clients already love into clinically meaningful conversation starters.
