


Interprofessional Education (IPE)

Eligibility for Licensure

Rules, Standards and Procedures | LPC (lpcboard.org)

- The board shall issue a provisional license to each provisional licensed professional counselor applicant who files an application upon a form designated by the board and in such a manner as the board prescribes, accompanied by such fee required by R.S. 37:1106 and who furnishes satisfactory evidence to the board that he/she:
- is at least 21 years of age;
- is of good moral character;
- is not in violation of any of the provisions of R.S. 37:1101-1123 and the rules and regulations adopted herein;

Eligibility for Licensure

- has received a graduate degree, the substance of which is professional mental health counseling in content from a regionally-accredited institution of higher education offering a master's and/or doctoral program in counseling that is approved by the board and has accumulated at least 60 graduate credit hours as part of the graduate degree plan containing the eight required areas, the supervised mental health practicum and supervised internship in mental health counseling or the total equivalent hours in practicum and internship. Applicants may apply post-masters counseling courses towards licensure if their degree program consisted of less than 60 hours. All graduate and post-masters counseling courses must be completed with a grade no lower than C. All field experience courses must be completed with a grade of A, B, or P.
- a. To be eligible for supervision as a provisional licensed professional counselor, the applicant must provide proof of completion of a supervised practicum and internship as listed below in item b. and at least one three-credit hour course in each of the following eight content areas. In order for a course to fulfill a content area requirement, it must include in a substantial manner the area in the description for the content areas;
- counseling/psychotherapy theories of personality, human growth and development, abnormal behavior, techniques of counseling/psychotherapy, group dynamics, processes, and counseling/psychotherapy, lifestyle and career development, appraisal of individuals, and ethics and professional orientation
- b. Mental Health Counseling Practicum and/or Internship

Eligibility for Licensure

- has obtained a board-approved supervisor;
- has obtained a board-approved practice setting;
- has provided to the board a declaration of practices and procedures, with the content being subject to board review and approval;
- has received a letter from the board certifying that all the requirements for provisional licensed professional counselor, as defined in this Chapter, were met before accruing supervised experience hours.

Education

- You must hold a master's, education specialist/educational specialist, certificate of advanced study (CAS), or doctoral degree in counseling from one of the following options:
- ▲ CACREP-accredited degree program: The program must have held CACREP accreditation the month you graduated.

or

A counseling program administered by an institutionally accredited educational institution: The program must include at least 48 semester hours or 72 quarter hours of graduate-level coursework AND at least six semester or 10 quarter hours of graduate degree–related supervised field experience in counseling.

Eligibility for Certification

- Career Counseling and Lifestyle Development

- Research and Program Evaluation
- Professional Orientation to Counseling
- Counseling Field Experience

Eligibility for Certification

Supervision

You must document at least 100 hours of postgraduate counseling supervision over a minimum 24-month period. This requirement may be waived in certain circumstances: for graduates of CACREP-accredited programs; for fully state-licensed professional counselors; for those who have had a degree conferred from a regionally accredited doctoral program in counseling.

Professional Endorsement

You must obtain endorsement from a professional colleague who holds a graduate degree in a mental health field. The individual providing endorsement cannot be related to the applicant and cannot be the same individual verifying supervision.

Work Experience

You must document having completed at least 3,000 hours of postgraduate counseling work experience over a minimum 24-month period. This requirement may be waived in certain circumstances: for graduates from CACREP-accredited programs; for fully state-licensed professional counselors; for those who have had a degree conferred from an institutionally accredited doctoral program in counseling.

Ethics

You are required to adhere to NBCC's ethical policies, including the NBCC <u>Code of Ethics</u>, the Certification Eligibility Policy - Ethics, the Ethics Case Procedures, and the Policy Regarding the Provision of Distance Professional Services. These important policies are available at: nbcc.org/ethics/certification.

Examination Requirement

 You must obtain a passing score on the <u>National Counselor Examination (NCE)</u> or the <u>National Clinical Mental Health Counseling</u> Examinations (NCMHCE).
