ABOUT LSUHNO SAHP

The School of Allied Health Professions (SAHP) at Louisiana State University Health New Orleans (LSUHNO) was established in 1970 by the Board of Supervisors and comprises undergraduate and graduate programs.

Baccalaureate degrees (Bachelor of Science) are offered in Cardiopulmonary Science and Medical Laboratory Science. The Department of Communication Disorders offers a Master of Communication Disorders degree in Speech-Language Pathology and a Doctor of Audiology degree. The Department of Occupational Therapy offers the Master of Occupational Therapy degree, the Department of Physical Therapy offers a Doctor of Physical Therapy degree, and the Department of Counseling offers the Master of Health Sciences degree. The SAHP also includes the Human Development Center, which provides programs to increase the capacity of professionals in health, mental health, education, and rehabilitation to support individuals with developmental and acquired disabilities and their families to participate in all aspects of community life.

The SAHP provides multidisciplinary outpatient services to achieve various patient objectives, including diagnostic, therapeutic, and restorative services. These services enable patients to gain as much functional, social, and occupational independence as possible.

Throughout the past year, the School of Allied Health Professions strengthened our infrastructure to advance our mission in teaching, research, and service. In the teaching area, we continued to increase and recruit new faculty across departments to bolster support for existing faculty and students. Additionally, we received additional funding to purchase educational resources and supplies to enhance student learning and skill acquisition before clinical fieldwork experiences. As part of our commitment to excellence, the School of Allied Health Professions worked toward finalizing our strategic plan to ensure alignment with LSUHNO's broader goals. To strengthen our sense of community, we expanded event offerings. These gatherings, including alumni events, partner day, white coat ceremonies, research day, dean's quarterly meetings, and student engagement activities, provide connections, celebration, and collaboration opportunities.





Did you know that smoking can increase your risk of hearing loss, imbalance, and tinnitus? Or that the smoking rate in Louisiana is higher than the national average? LSUHNO students Kelly Anders, Andi Buisson, and Coursey Pitts partnered with the Louisiana Campaign to compile research on the effects of smoking on the hearing and balance systems.

FACULTY SPOTLIGHT

Dr. Dania RishiqASSISTANT PROFESSOR

Dr. Rishiq is a new LSU Health New Orleans faculty member, joining the Communication Disorders Department in January 2024. She earned her doctoral degree from the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, TN. Following her graduation in 2013, she worked at multiple research sites, such as Starkey, the Mayo Clinic, and the University of South Alabama.

Rishiq's research background is extensive and can accommodate and fit students with various interests. She is primarily interested in speech-evoked auditory brainstem responses, aural rehabilitation, hearing aids, cognition and aging, understanding speech in noise, and the relationship between cardiovascular health and the auditory system. She is currently interested in gait and postural stability assessments and hopes to use them as outcome measures of audiologic interventions.

At a personal level, she enjoys road trips, hiking, and traveling. She also enjoys participating in diversity events and hopes to support diverse populations in her research.

When asked to advise current graduate students. Dr. Rishiq said, "I would like to advise young students to take their twenties very seriously. It's the most important decade of their lives, and it influences the rest of their future decades. Life is too short and fleeting! Go out there and achieve your dreams!"

RESEARCH AND GRANTS

Congratulations to Dr. Megan Guidry and Dr. Megan Majoue on receiving the 2024 SAHP Intramural Research Grant for their project "Critical Thinking: A Program Review of Allied Health Students"!

This interprofessional project aims to characterize baseline critical thinking skills of health professions students and identify factors that predict critical thinking abilities across several health professional programs.







STUDENT ACTIVITIES

Our second-year audiology students were allowed to observe a Brainstem Auditory Evoked Response (BAER) test on Dogo Argentino puppies at Hillside Veterinary Clinic!

The BAER test is a non-invasive, painless procedure that measures your pet's brain activity in response to sound. It evaluates the function of the auditory pathways from the ear to the brainstem. During the test, electrodes are placed on your pet's scalp, and they are exposed to clicks or tones through earphones. The electrodes capture the brain's response to these sounds, which are then recorded and analyzed to assess hearing function.

Certain dog breeds, including Dogo Argentinos, Dalmatians, Boxers, Bull Terriers, and Australian Shepherds, are more susceptible to hearing loss due to genetic factors, especially those with coat colors like white or merle. The BAER test can also be used for pets with a history of ear infections, head trauma, or suspected hearing loss.


SHARON ANDERSON SANDERS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP


NATIONAL SPEECH-LANGUAGE-HEARING MONTH



From a program effectiveness perspective, the CoARC views the RRT credential as a measure of a program's success in inspiring its graduates to achieve their highest educational and professional aspirations. Programs were required to: (1) have three or more years of outcomes data; (2) hold accreditation without a progress report at the end of the year; (3) document RRT credentialing success of 90% or above, and (4) meet or exceed established CoARC thresholds for TMC exam high cut score and retention.



OUTSTANDING THERAPIST AWARD: DR. JOHN ZAMJAHN





Congratulations, Dr. McCarthy! Dr. McCarthy is a Professor Emeritus in the Department of Counseling and still sits on our Advisory Board.










50TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION




SERVICES PROVIDED

HDC COURSES AT LSUHSC

Improving Accessibility in Healthcare with Dr. Rose Angelocci

In 2024, HDC faculty member Dr. Rose Angelocci guided 12 students from various LSUHSC schools through a dynamic course focused on effective communication strategies for working with individuals who are blind or visually impaired. This course equips future healthcare professionals with essential skills to enhance patient care and promote inclusivity in medical settings.

GRANTS & CONTRACTS AWARDED TO HDC

In fiscal year 2024, HDC secured nearly \$8.5M in funding, including over \$6M from federal grants. The LASARD project, which provides training and coaching for K-12 educators, received over \$1.6M in contracts from school districts across Louisiana. Additional revenue was generated through tuition for the Early Learning Center, fees for pre-employment transition services in partnership with Louisiana Rehabilitation Services, and other income from clinical services, professional development, and post-secondary transition services.

Collectively, these funding streams enable HDC to support a workforce of over 40 full-time staff and faculty members.

Incorporating evidence-based practices, HDC works with educational and multidisciplinary support professionals to create more inclusive, accessible environments for individuals with disabilities.


In FY24, HDC provided **268 hours** of professional development and **2,558 hours** of coaching to **2,787 individual professionals.**

HDC made a splash at two major conferences held in New Orleans:

Teacher Leader Summit

Teacher Leader Summit is Louisiana's premier professional learning event. Thousands of Louisiana educators dedicate part of their summer break to improving their craft and preparing for the school year ahead. HDC staff presented five sessions on a variety of topics.



2024 TASH Conference

TASH advances equity, opportunity, and inclusion for people with disabilities, focusing on those with the most significant support needs, in education, employment, and community living. HDC staff and faculty presented three sessions focused on inclusive education and transition, including the conference's plenary session.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SPOTLIGHT



LADBP hosts statewide CVI workshops

The Louisiana DeafBlind Project (LADBP) hosted "Cerebral/Cortical Visual Impairment (CVI): Impact and Compensatory Strategies" workshops in Lafayette, New Orleans, Ruston, and Alexandria in spring 2024. With more than 138 participants across the state, the workshops' turnout included a diverse group of early intervention providers and special education personnel.

GeneBIORETS

HDC's Dr. Michael Norman is codirector of the GeneBIORETS program within the LSUH School of Medicine. This program provides Louisiana high school teachers specialized training to enhance their science curricula. Dr. Norman offered educators a greater understanding of supporting students with disabilities, including disability policy and Universal Design for Learning. Additionally, HDC's Dr. Rose Angelocci and Nicky Gillies conducted hands-on training sessions with a particular emphasis on supporting students who are deaf or hard of hearing, blind, or have low vision.

The Audiology Clinic works with cochlear implant patients in pre- and postoperative assessment, programming and troubleshooting, and in rehabilitation and counseling for all cochlear implant brands. The clinic has on-site electrophysiology and vestibular equipment for students to get hands-on advanced testing.

This technique is performed by physical therapists in conjunction with therapeutic exercise to reduce pain, muscle tension, and improve functional mobility. The therapist inserts a thin filiform needle, without medication or injection, through the skin into painful muscles throughout the body known as trigger points.
