

MASTER OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY (MOT) ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS

Deadline for applications to OTCAS for the class starting January 2027 is June 1, 2026.

However, it is recommended that you submit your application two weeks prior to the deadline to give OTCAS time to verify your transcripts.

INFORMATION SESSIONS:

The Master of Occupational Therapy (MOT) program conducts Information Sessions both in-person and via Zoom for individuals interested in applying for admission. These group sessions include an overview of the program and information on admissions procedures. In-person attendees will also be provided with a short tour.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Admission to the Master of Occupational Therapy (MOT) Program is on a competitive basis; therefore, meeting the following minimal requirements **does not** guarantee admission into the program. Preference is given to Louisiana residents. Consideration is given to applicants who can document exceptional academic achievement, applicants who can document success in overcoming challenges and obstacles such as, but not limited to, low socioeconomic household or first-generation college, and to re-applicants. Admission requirements are as follows:

1. Completion of a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited college or university. All fields of study are accepted; no preference is given to one major area of study over another.
2. Applicants are expected to have a minimum overall cumulative GPA of 2.8 for their undergraduate degree, and a cumulative GPA of 3.0 for prerequisite courses for admission to the MOT program.
3. Completion of prerequisite courses with a minimum grade of "C". All pre-req courses must be taken through an accredited educational institution. Completion of all prerequisite courses is not required **prior to applying** to the program. You may have *no more than 3 outstanding prerequisites* at the time that you apply, and you must report a plan regarding when you will complete the remaining courses.

PREREQUISITE COURSES		
Course	Credit Hours	Comments
Human Anatomy*	3	Must be taken in the past four years. Neuroanatomy not accepted.
Human Anatomy Lab*	1	Must be taken in the past four years.
Human Physiology*	3	Exercise physiology not accepted.
Kinesiology (Biomechanics) OR Biomechanics OR Physics OR Chemistry	3	Beginning with cohort starting 1/2028, Chemistry will no longer be accepted. Kinesiology with a biomechanics emphasis, Biomechanics, or Physics will be required.
Abnormal Psychology	3	Psychopathology or Pathopsychology accepted.
Human Development Across the Lifespan	3	Course must cover birth to death or separate child, adolescence and adult courses will be required.
Sociology or Anthropology	3	Any Sociology or Anthropology course is accepted. Philosophy courses not accepted.
Statistics	3	Must cover descriptive and inferential statistics (correlation, significant difference).
*If Anatomy and Human Physiology courses are taken as Anatomy & Physiology I and Anatomy & Physiology II instead of as separate courses, then a total of seven credits are needed for the combined course content.		

4. Completion of at least 40 documented OT observation hours under the supervision of a licensed occupational therapy practitioner. Up to 20 hours (but no more) may be under the supervision of a certified occupational therapy assistant (COTA). The observation hours should include experiences in an adult client setting *and* a pediatric client setting. As few as one occupational therapist at one site and as many as four therapists at four different facilities can be used to complete the 40 hours.
 - A *Documentation of Experience* (DOE) form must be completed by each supervising occupational therapy practitioner to verify hours of contact.
 - It is permissible to have multiple completed DOE forms, as long as any individual form reflects at least 10 or more hours.
 - You are responsible for following the instructions on the top of each form and distributing the forms to the supervising occupational therapy practitioner.
 - The occupational therapy practitioner completing the form will submit the completed form to the school via email, following the instructions on the bottom of the form. This form, along with its instructions, can be downloaded at <https://alliedhealth.lsuhsu.edu/ot/docs/doeofexperience.pdf>
5. Applicants must secure three professional references to complete an evaluation on their behalf via OTCAS. The reference letters (sometimes called Letters of Evaluation, Letters of Reference, or Letters of Recommendation) are submitted by the evaluators themselves via Letters by Liaison, the OTCAS recommender portal. Refer to OTCAS for instruction on the evaluation process. [Click here](#) for more information.
6. Completion of the Personal Statement on the OTCAS admission portal. It should be written at a graduate level and demonstrate that you have a good understanding of the occupational therapy profession and therapist roles and functions.
7. After the OTCAS submission deadline, each application will be reviewed and scored using the items outlined above. The highest scoring applicants will be invited for an on-site interview. Interviews typically take place in early to mid-August.
8. Participation in an on-site interview is required for admission. An on-site writing sample will also be completed on date of interview and is required. Each applicant's interview and writing sample will be scored as part of the admissions decision. Admission decision notifications are typically made in late summer to early fall.

OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Recommended courses (but not required): Medical Terminology, Public Speaking, Technical Writing, and a basic Research course.
- Students are expected to be proficient in basic computer literacy, i.e. word processing, spreadsheet management, Internet navigation, and e-mail procedures.
